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Dvar Torah - The Influence of Materialism by Rabbi Yehuda Bergida



“שהיא מדה טובה מכל המדות – טובות – It is the best of all virtuous character traits.” The Ramban in his *Igeres*, extols the benefits of humility, and warns of the dangers

of haughtiness. A person who lacks modesty and humility can remain impervious to even the most compelling motivating factors to do *teshuva*. Many factors can influence a person’s pride, not the least of which is one’s surroundings.

We see an example of how one’s environment can affect his humility in our *Parsha*. After *Paroh* is subjected to the plague of *dam*, we are told that he returned to his palace and his heart did not heed the message of the plague. *Rabbeinu Bachya*, at the beginning of *Parshas Bo*, comments on the fact that the Torah tells us *Paroh* first returned to his palace, and only

then did he ignore the plague. *Rabbeinu Bachya* attributes *Paroh’s* ability to tune out the call to repent, due the pride and arrogance he felt upon entering his palatial home.

When one analyzes this, it is truly astonishing. All of Egypt was in turmoil; there was no water to drink. The *Medrash* tells us that even the walls of *Paroh’s* palace were dripping blood! *Paroh*, however, when surrounded by his royal trappings, was impervious to the message of the devastating plague.

We see how far one’s being in comfortable, materialistic surroundings can dampen the effects of a call to *teshuva*. Let us recognize that when we are in our own “castles” and feeling quite comfortable with our worldly successes, there is a danger that we too could come to ignore the call to *teshuva*.

Dvar Halacha – מדבר שקר תרחק

“מדבר שקר תרחק - Distance yourself from a lie.” Our sages tell us that this *halacha* applies even if the falsehood will not hurt another person. This *halacha* not only prohibits outright verbal lying, but a number of other types of deceptions as well. If two people are whispering amongst themselves, one should not approach them and ask what they are talking about. Since they will likely lie

about the content of their conversation, you will be causing them to lie. Additionally, one should not make a statement that has a dual meaning in a situation where the listener will be led to misinterpret the statement. Even using simple body language in a way that misleads others is considered a violation of this *halacha*.

Gedolei Roshei Yeshiva Visit YTC



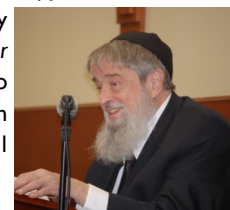
