Dvar Torah - A Study in Opposites by Rabbi Noam Grossman

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In the beginning of *Parshas Pekudei*, the *Torah* discusses how the different materials given for the *Mishkan* were used. The

Medrash Rabbah

(פי נ"א סימן ו') relates that *Moshe* volunteered to undertake an exact accounting of what everything was

used for in order to remove any suspicion from himself. The *Medrash* asks why he felt it necessary to prove himself. After all, *Hashem* Himself testified regarding *Moshe's* integrity when He said ב"כ ב"ת"י "נאמן הוא". The *Medrash* answers that *Moshe* overheard a conversation take place behind his back when he was on his way to his tent. There are two versions of this conversation, but according to one of them, it took place between two "*chot'im b'yisrael*"--sinners among the Jews. One person said to the other, "Look how fat *Moshe's* neck is," to which the other responded, "Of course. Someone who is responsible for so much money is sure to pocket some of it." When *Moshe* heard this, he decided to go through an exact accounting to remove any suspicion from himself. The *Etz Yosef* comments that the main reason these people were watching *Moshe* go back to his tent

was for the purpose of seeing the *Amud He'anan* - the cloud of *Hashem's* glory - descending upon his tent and bowing down to it (this descent took place whenever *Moshe* would enter his tent).

The commentary of the *Etz Yosef* is difficult to understand. It seems that at the very moment in time when these people were watching *Moshe* go back to his tent, intent on witnessing a miracle - at that moment they were belittling the person who was the at the very root of their inspiration! How could this be?

Apparently, the complexity of the human being is such that one can not only have conflicting feelings, but have them at the very same moment. We tend to think that if we feel a certain way about someone or something, other feelings can't exist. At times we assume, based on certain actions and behaviors of others, that they must feel a certain way about us. We see from the *Etz Yosef* that things don't necessarily work this way; just as one can have great admiration for someone but mock that person at the same time, there may be other opposite feelings that coexist within us. Let us take this lesson to help judge ourselves and others more favorably and not jump to conclusions about ourselves or others simply based on specific feelings that we may observe. Let us remind ourselves to be on guard and not allow our *yetzer hara*, our evil inclination, to spoil moments of potential inspiration.

Dvar Halacha - Studying Hilchos Pesach 30 Days Before by Yehudah Silverman, 10th Grade

The Shulchan Aruch brings down that one should begin to study the halachos of Pesach thirty days prior, which happens to be Purim. We learn this halacha from the fact that *Moshe* commanded the Jewish people about Pesach Sheni on Pesach Rishon, which is thirty days earlier. The Mishnah Berurah

brings down different opinions amongst the Acharonim regarding whether this thirty-day requirement also applies to the Yomim Tovim of Succos and Shavuos. Because of the many halachos of matzah, burning chametz and kashering kelim, all opinions agree that thirty days of study are required before Pesach.
