Dvar Torah -Stay Focused

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The פסוק states: וישמע אברם כי נשבה אחיו וירק את חניכיו ילידי ביתו שמונה עשר ושלוש מאות (יד). "And heard that his brother (לוט) was held captive and he armed his 318 students born in his house."

The גמרא in נדרים (32a) explains that when the פסוק states that אברם armed his battalion of 318, it means that he fortified them with precious stones and gems, lest they became distracted in war, in order that they could remain focused on the מצוה of saving לוט.

The question arises: These disciples were the great תלמידים of אברהם אבינו. According to one interpretation, it was his אליעזר (which is the גמטריא of 318) who say that all of the Torah that אברהם knew was transferred to אליעזר! Surely, אברהם אבינו's students, and particularly אליעזר, could be trusted to stay focused on the מצוה of הצלת נפשות! Why was אברהם so worried that they would be distracted by the desire for the spoils of war?

We must conclude that even if אברהם had not

given them any money in advance of the war, they would not be suspected to take any spoils until the war was over. However, they would have been placed in a situation of major turmoil. אברהם understood that the mental energy expended to withstand this נסיון would have caused a slight distraction from the מצוה at hand. This lapse could spell disaster and keep them from totally concentrating on saving לוט, especially with all the gleam and glitter sparkling in front of them. This is why he stuffed their pockets with gems.

Many of us, much like אברהם אבינו's disciples, are committed to our current lives with tremendous מסירת נפש. We put forth great efforts to raise our children and grandchildren ע"פ דרך התורה. Yet, as we see from this episode with אברהם, it is very easy for us to become distracted. The יצר הרע will accept even a slight decline from the high standards and convictions we committed to uphold on יום כיפור.

Let's revitalize our excitement and התלהבות to go about our עבודה with pure נפש. We will fulfill the lofty goals we set out to accomplish, and provide tremendous merit and זכויות for ourselves, our children, and all of ישראל.

Dvar Halacha - Saying ברכת התורה

One must say ברכת התורה before learning any חומש, משנה, מדרש, or גמרא. According to many ראשונים, this ברכה is actually required מדאורייתא. However, there are different opinions as to what type of learning requires saying the ברכה. Everyone agrees that if one is speaking words of תורה, a ברכה is required since that is actually learning תורה. According to the מחבר, if one is writing words of תורה, for example writing a ספר, he is required to make a ברכה. The משנה ברורה limits the requirement of making ברכת התורה in the case of writing to a situation where one has the intention of learning. If, however, one is only transcribing or translating words of תורה with no intention of learning, then no ברכה is required. There are אחרונים, though,

who hold that writing is no different than having thoughts of תורה and therefore would never require a ברכה. The משנה ברורה suggests speaking out the words that one is writing in order to reach the requirement for saying a ברכה.
